This has truly been an exciting year for the Recreation Services Department. There are so many **successes** to share from this past fiscal year (October through September) and I hope you are as excited as I am while reading this report. For the first time, our united Department is **sharing our accomplishments**, highlights, and ways we served the citizens of Boca as well as our citizens living within the Greater Boca Raton Beach and Park District boundaries.

While I have only been in my position for a little over a year, I have witnessed firsthand the **passion** of our volunteers, our Friends of the Library and Friends of Gumbo Limbo groups, our vendors and program providers, our community partners, and my fellow 800+ team members. The Boca Raton community has high standards and we continually do our best to **exceed expectations** while creating new experiences for our citizens and visitors.

Some of the accomplishments I'm most proud of include:

- Our 1,000,000 items checked out in our libraries
- The team maintaining 1,547 acres of developed parks land
- Over 180,000 people attended special events across our Department
- Making distinct progress with City Council and our citizens on the Waterfront Master Plan
- Hillsboro El Rio Park Phase II being approved and moving to construction with the inclusion of 4 new permanent pickleball courts, our city's first
- 26 team members promoted in the past year. Our volunteers who gave the Department almost 51,000 hours of services—a value of about \$1.25 million

- Our “STEAM through September” initiative, which led to increased collaboration among our Recreation facilities, while also promoting science, technology, engineering, art and mathematics for 623 children
- Our adapted use of the NRPA’s Wildlife Explorers program from the Children’s Science Explorium which served 70 children

## Athletics

Athletics encompasses Sugar Sand Park Field House, COBRA (City of Boca Raton Athletics) Programs, 34 athletic fields, 18 basketball courts, 10 tennis courts, 4 racquetball courts, 2 volleyball courts plus the Tim Huxhold Skatepark and Shuffleboard Courts. Athletics celebrated several milestones this year:

- Significant soccer goal safety improvements by replacing prior soccer goals with new no-tip goals that have built in weighted sand barrels.
- Athletics (COBRA) directly coached and mentored 471 children in various sports classes as well as programs for T-Ball, volleyball, and basketball.
- Hosted the first Pickleball tournament at the Field House.

- COBRA Youth Flag Football participation increased by 18% and COBRA Fall T-Ball program participation increased by 33%.
- COBRA Adult Flag Football league continues to be one of the largest in the state of Florida by averaging 34 teams per season and COBRA Adult Softball league averages close to 100 teams per season with three seasons yearly.
- 532% increase in shuffleboard court participation.

Within the 19/20 fiscal year, the team is set to open the Hillsboro El Rio Phase II (south of 18th St.) section. The project includes a sand volleyball court, a basketball court, two tennis courts, four pickleball courts, pavilions, and a playground.

Ballfield maintenance made several field improvements this year. The field at Don Estridge School was re-sodded. The baseball/softball fields were all top dressed with conditioner, increasing moisture management and decreased game day rainouts. Crews used SHOCKWAVE to aerify turf and increase the quality. In the next year, three rectangle fields at Patch Reef will be converted to synthetic turf and the athletic fields at University Woodlands Park will be going under construction in March of 2019 to

renovate the rectangle fields as well as the baseball field. Renovation includes installing underground drainage, new soil and new Bermuda turf.

## Aquatics

Aquatics team manages both the Meadows Park Pool and the Swim Center. This year, a high-efficiency LED lighting system was installed at Meadows, providing a safer swimming atmosphere, a better customer experience and saving energy. In the next year, the new Greater Boca Raton Beach and Park District Swim Center building will be completed and open to the public; Meadows Park Pool is expected to undergo resurfacing.

From South Beach through Red Reef and north to Spanish River, the Ocean Rescue team patrols 2 miles of beaches. Several of our Ocean Rescue members took part in the small teams division of the USLA (US Lifeguard Association) Championships and brought home 5th place. The team had 61 rescues during the year.

## Park Maintenance

Park maintenance is responsible for all common grounds and parks areas—from mowing, to tree trimming, to parking lot lighting. Park maintenance also cares for the popular Mizner Dog Park. We spent the early part of the fiscal year cleaning up debris throughout the City after Hurricane Irma. We also renovated playgrounds at George Snow Park and Red Reef Park which entailed removing old equipment, and placing new equipment, including shade structures and fresh ground surfaces. Picnic tables were replaced at Sugar Sand Park with a sturdy, graffiti-resistant variety. Future plans include restroom replacements at the beaches, and a permanent restroom solution at Mizner Dog Park.

## Tennis

Boca Raton's Tennis division covers three separate centers—Boca Raton Tennis Center, Patch Reef Park Tennis Center and The Racquet Center. Patch Reef Park Tennis Center was awarded the Grassroots Program of the Year from the USTA Wheelchair National Committee. The award, voted on by athletes across the globe, acknowledges the wheelchair tennis instructional program we have there. The Racquet Center, even while undergoing renovations to the facility, has increased programming revenue 7%. In the coming year, with the new facility open to the public, and renovated Pro Shop, we expect even more customer use and satisfaction. The Boca Raton Tennis Center team worked on a rejuvenation project, with new signs, new equipment, and some fresh paint. Our future plans for the tennis facilities include the completion of The Swim & Racquet Center, some court renovations, and upgrades to existing facilities.

The Community Events section was responsible for 20 City-wide events this fiscal year. The marquee events for the Department include the Fabulous 4th, Holiday Tree Lighting, Holiday Street Parade, Holiday Boat Parade, and Brazilian Beat. Through strategic marketing efforts, the Boat Parade participation increased from 29 to 56 boats. Community Events also organized the Boca Raton March For Our Lives event in the spring, plus revitalized the Community Events webpage and Facebook page.

The Park Rangers' mission is to assist our guests with a positive experience in City Parks. From assisting with parking to patrolling, Rangers perform a variety of duties within the City parks and facilities. The Ranger team is responsible for service 16 hours daily, 365 days a year. Rangers also monitor the dog beach and dog park. Accomplishments this year include working cooperatively with the Library, Boca Raton Community Middle School and Boca Raton Police Department.

## Beautification & Irrigation

The Beautification and Irrigation teams work hand-in-hand to keep our City green and beautiful. Team members are responsible for cleaning 1,200 miles of curbs and sidewalks; we pick up trash on City property 365 days a year. We take care of 643 medians and this year planted 321 trees and 80 palms. We also installed over 5,000 feet of irrigation pipe, plus new solar controllers and spray heads at locations throughout the City. For the upcoming year, the second phase of Clint Moore Road—2 miles to the turnpike—will be completed and the south side of Palmetto Park Road from I-95 to 12th avenue will be beautified.

## Cemetery & Mausoleum

The Cemetery is a peaceful setting located in the heart of Boca Raton. The team is committed to working compassionately with families and visitors to make sure all needs are fulfilled. We assist families through some of their toughest times. This year, the team oversaw 202 burials in the cemetery. The Cemetery complex includes 19 acres of land (14.5 in use) and the Mausoleum complex covers 5.3 acres. Four new Mausoleum buildings are currently under construction with an expected completion date of Spring 2019.

The Boca Raton Public Library provides outstanding educational and recreational programs and services at two beautiful locations – the Downtown Library and the Spanish River Library. Over 54,500 patrons attended popular programs such as children’s story times and youth STEM activities, book clubs for all ages, technology and software training, engaging lectures and author events for adults, and Summer Reading. Our Touch a Truck and Summer Reading Kickoff events hosted over 5,000 participants having fun in hands-on learning experiences. This year’s library-wide theme was Discover You: Resources for Better Living and included classes on financial literacy, business and health. We have over 847,000 items in our physical and digital collections, including current books, downloadable and streaming music, STEM kits for youth, American Girl Dolls and baking pans. This year, our patrons checked out over 1,000,000 items! Our modern and comfortable libraries also provided social and work space for over 513,900 visitors, while assisting with 226,500 information and technology questions, 34,300 study room uses, 63,000 public computer sessions, and over 4,000 voters for the midterm primary elections.

## Golf

The Golf division maintains and operates 2 golf courses, providing high levels of customer service by maintaining healthy turf grass conditions at both locations. This year, the team executed a significant project by renovating the Red Reef Golf Operations cart wash area. We installed piping, catch basins and drain pipes to eliminate a drainage issue. As part of the project, we also installed new sod, a new rock pathway and more than 30 ornamentals and trees.

## Community Centers

The Community Centers consist of three separate Community Center buildings, plus the Children's Science Explorium, the Willow Theatre, and Camp Boca. The Community Centers section serves more than 500,000 customers annually. The three community centers hosted 2,342 public meetings and worked with the Art In Public Places Program which provided both venues and opportunities for local artists to display their work. Community Centers sell beach, boat and dog permits; register patrons for classes; create and run our own special events; and run specialty summer programs for over 2,000 children. Highlights this year include the Institute for Learning in Retirement partnership at Boca Raton Community Center (BRCC) and the Senior Day trips offered by James A. Rutherford Community Center (JARCC); both of these programs encourage senior populations to stay active. Sugar Sand Park Community Center (SSPCC) and JARCC offer special events throughout the year including Shriek Week, Pirates & Princesses, Children's Fairs, Piles of Smiles Snow Day and Arts Spark which attract over 20,000 visitors annually. SSPCC made facility improvements, including replacing several air handling units in the facility. SSPCC also created and implemented Special Needs Programs to focus on an underserved population in the community; the team added four new children's class offerings; created the First Fridays Preschool Program, a collaboration with other Department facilities; as well as increased the Summer Specialty Programs to 25 different options.

## Camp Boca

Camp Boca provides summer and out of school opportunities for children to enjoy a fun, enriching experience that includes field trips. Each day, children are cared for from 7:30 am to as late as 6:00 pm. This program provides an adventuresome and safe child care opportunity for the youth of our community and their working parents; while the cost of the program is kept low, to assist Boca's working families. Activities offered at each of the sites also provide a way for our youth to connect with the outdoors and enhance their leisure opportunities. This summer, Camp Boca's six-week elementary camps and elementary extended camps were all at capacity for the summer with 1,233 enrollments.

## Gumbo Limbo Nature Center

Gumbo Limbo Nature Center provides unique opportunities for visitors. This year nearly 200,000 guests participated in programs, including daily talks at the outdoor aquariums and sea turtle rehabilitation facility; guided nature walks; and paddling tours of the intracoastal waterway. Guest experience was improved by installing wayfinding directions throughout the facility; redesigning the front windows; adding exhibits in the FAU viewing gallery, and improving site security. We also expanded summer camp hours with an extended care option. This year's Sea Turtle Day Festival attracted 3,500 visitors. New events included an outdoor movie night, Luna's (our Sea Turtle mascot) birthday party and a young writer's contest. We are looking forward to the reconstruction of the popular 40-foot tall observation tower and completion of the boardwalk loop in 2019.

## Willow Theatre & Children's Science Explorium

The Willow Theatre is nestled inside the Sugar Sand Park Community Center building. Annually, the City contracts with performers for over 35 productions throughout the year, from musicals, to concerts, original works and classic favorites. A new subscription service was instituted for the upcoming 18/19 season which will allow patrons who purchase at least three different shows the opportunity for discounted tickets. The box office was reorganized to be more customer-forward. The Children's Science Explorium is also located within the same building. This year, after a 2-year science team-driven process, which included help from park maintenance to clear the area, the Science Garden officially opened in February. It added roughly 3,200 square feet of exterior teaching and exhibit space, with 16 garden beds that have attracted over 25 different butterfly species this year. Our team created and implemented a very successful new Super Hero Academy Birthday Party program. We continue to develop new

programs based on the two traveling exhibits each year as well as provide 8 weeks of summer science camp, along with weeklong programs during Spring and Winter school breaks.
